Personal Protective Equipment information - ACC There are several questions around the use and supply of Personal Protective Equipment. The Ministry of Health has excellent resources and advice around keeping safe, and they recommend all providers familiarise themselves with this information.

The most important message continues to be that basic hygiene measures are the best defence against COVID-19.

PPE for home and community support workers COVID-19 is a pathogen that causes illness, so it is appropriate that the Ministry is the lead agency for the delivery of prevention and care services. ACC is following the advice of the Ministry, including its guidelines for the use and distribution of PPE. As announced by the Ministry this week, home and community care workers will need to request any additional PPE through their

PPE for clients ACC cannot provide PPE beyond what has already been provided for a client's injury or recovery support. If a client is concerned

about their wellbeing, and feels additional PPE may be necessary for their care, a Telehealth assessment from a nurse can be

requested from their contact at ACC.


